Museums and their publics in the modern world

Museums of science and technology fulfil many functions. For some, the main purpose is the diffusion of today's knowledge. Others see themselves as guardians of a precious heritage of historic objects. And others again seek to foster public debate about the political and social issues raised by science and its applications in modern society. But how well do museums, widely respected but costly, fulfil their various roles? A reflexion on three great Parisian institutions (the Cité des sciences et de l'industrie, the Palais de la découverte, and the Musée des arts et metiers) and their place in the wider European world of museological practice helps us to understand the strengths and weaknesses of a form of communication that dates back, in France, to the Revolution.
